BEST PRACTICE 1

Title of the Practice: Cycle expedition by NCC Cadets to promote character building through social work and create social awareness.

Objective of the practice: The N C C unit of Ramniranjan Jhunjhunwala College is affiliated to 6 Maharashtra Battalion, Mumbai group A. The N C C unit of our college has a unit of 60 cadets and has tremendous support from the alumni of our college who were in NCC during their college days. They have always been very proactive and the cycle expedition was envisaged with two major objectives:

- A. To create social awareness regarding: Save the girl child-Beti Padhao Beti Bachao. Swatch Bharat Abhiyan, Go Green, Anti Eve teasing, Anti social habits, and most important to develop the spirit of National Integration.
- B. To develop among the cadets Character building through social work, spirit of adventure, team spirit, leadership, sportsmanship, endurance.

The context: Once the idea was conceived that NCC cadets are the best ambassadors to spread the message of patriotism, Nationalist feeling among the youth. The main challenge was mobilisation of monetary resources once the expedition was planned. Cadets had to be trained both physically and mentally. All materials for spreading social awareness had to be properly. Safety of cadets during the expedition had be ensured. Health issues if any during the expedition had to be addressed. With experience and proper planning of the itinary and training of the cadets has gone a long way in the cycle expedition. Proper image building measures have to be taken.

The Practice: N C C cadets are trained for cycle expedition so that their physical fitness is not compromised. There is detailed planning of the expedition. A map is worked out and two former cadets do an initial survey (Reiki) to finalise the route of the expedition. A budget is prepared looking into the minute details. The academic calendar of the college is considered so that the expedition does not clash with examinations. The academic time lost by the cadet is taken care by extra coaching done by the mentors. All permissions as per requirement are taken. Medical check up of cadets is done to ensure their physical fitness for the expedition. New cycles are purchased and/or old one are maintained. Along with the cadets on cycle there are six escorts former cadets (alumni) on motorcycle and in canter. The canter carries all the belongings of the

cadets, along with medicines, food, snack, water etc. The cycle expedition passes through cities and villages cadets interact with villagers, chief of the Panchayat spread social awareness by way of skits and banners.

Evidence of success: The cycle expedition which was started in 2007-2008 due to the efforts of our N C C cadets, former and current, sponsors and donors cycle expedition has become a regular activity which the entire college looks forward to. The cycle expeditions which have been successfully organised in the previous years have been:

2007-2008: Mumbai to Purandar (Maharashtra)

2008-2009 : Mumbai to Ashtavinayak (circle route) (Maharashtra)

2009-2010: Mumbai to Wagha Border (Punjab)

2010-2011 : Mumbai to Kanya Kumari (Tamil Nadu)

2011-2012: Mumbai to Dwarka (Gujarat)

2012-2013: Mumbai to Sriharikota (Andhra Pradesh)

2013-2014: Mumbai –Nasik-Kasa-Mumbai

2014-2015: Mumbai to OTA (Chennai)

2016-2017: Mumbai to RIMC (Dehradun)

2017-2018: Mumbai to Parli (Maharashtra)

Problems encountered and resources required: The parents had to counselled about the need for such expeditions. They were briefed about the security measures and precautions taken by the authorities for the safe and successful completion of the expedition. Permissions to be sought from Police. Information to be provided to the commanding officer of NCC. Detailed preparation of route map. Training of cadets to cycle safely minimum 100KM per day. Ensuring physical fitness of cadets. Preparing detail of schedule, budget for the entire expedition. Most important was the financial resources and its proper utilisation. Funds are generated by sponsorships from various agencies. Hindi Vidya Prachar Samiti also provides financial assistance, the staff also contributes. College provides with bicycles as and when required. Students also contribute in their own way. Some agencies provide with drinking water, medicines, ORS, packed dry snacks etc. Any help is a welcome since it contributes to the success of cycle expedition. Mobilisation of monetary resources is the main problem and we

BEST PRACTICE 2

Title of the practice: Waste management in the college

Objectives of the practice: To identify the sources and types of solid, liquid and e- waste in the college and how to recycle, reuse and reduce them.

The context: As a higher educational Institution paper is most used commodity. It is used as answer books, supplements, question paper (confidential), letter heads for official communication within and outside the college, newspapers, dailies, periodicals. Biodegradable solid waste in the form of leaves, flowers, agar, culture medium etc. Laboratories are the main source of liquid waste. Reduction of plastic in the premises. In view of the fact that laboratories generate liquid waste which may be hazardous and non hazardous. The main concerns where how to dispose them and alternatively how to reduce the amount of hazardous chemicals so that no waste is generated or if generated is minimum. Similarly some chemicals are costly which can be recycled or reused. E-waste mainly from computer laboratories and offices.

The Practice: The first waste which has been recycled for last thirty years successfully is recycling of all the answer books which are preserved for three years after every examination is sent to the factory and a certificate to that effect is obtained. Similarly old newspapers are collected and also sent to factory for recycling. This practice has been continued for many years. We are planning to further reduce use of paper by using online system of examination atleast at one level. Our next major effort was to go paperless in our internal communications. Plastics usage has been minimised. As a first step no plastic cups and containers, no plastic bags. A step towards that was to make Notice groups and students whatsapp groups for every class. Last two years students identity card has RFID which is tagged with their phones. So all major notices, announcements are sent through bulk sms. This has been successfully implemented and has helped in reducing the number of letter heads being used. The biotechnology department provides with a consortium for degrading the biodegradable waste to form compost. The biotechnology department has also set up an biogas uit to experiment with different substrates which can be utilized. The chemistry department used a large number of liquids which were mainly disposed through sink. The department discussed how the practicals can be modified to practice green chemistry. All the hazardous waste were either bypassed or reduced to micro litre. The glass wares are also accordingly of smaller quantity and some synthesis are now being done using the microwave method without hazardous chemicals. The IT department played a proactive role in joining hands with a company which collects e waste accordingly all the e waste which is collected is given to them.

Evidence of Success: The answer papers represent confidential material so has to recycled in through a factory. Teachers, members of supporting staff and students have accepted the information provided via website, whatsapp and bulk sms and all have realised that reducing paper is protecting planet earth by saving the trees. Some departments have become totally paperless. Plastic usage is negligible. The biodegradable waste is composted. E waste is again properly collected and sent for recycling.

Problems encountered and resources: Counselling at all level is most important this was achieved through slogans, street plays and whatsapp group. Money was also needed to change from conventional methods to green chemistry and this was accepted by all. The main concern is also sustainability which is ensured by refining the process as and when needed.
