The following syllabus for FYBA titled Moral Philosophy (Semester I & II) proposed to be brought into effect from the academic year 2018-2019

Objectives of the Course: The course aims to:

- a. Familiarize students with significant slices of the history of moral theory from Greek to contemporary times and Vedic Philosophy.
- b. Inculcate in students a sense of morality based on analytical reasoning rather than dogmatic assertion.
- c. Provide students with an ethical framework for taking moral decisions in different areas of life.

It will encourage students to appreciate the relevance of different moral cultures and out looks in a globalized world and take the ethical decision in different walks of life.
